If you like the old way, stay in the SPA

THE PRESIDENTS PERSPECTIVE



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The HOTLANTA contest in July was perhaps the very best."weatherwise" that we've had in the last 6 to 8 years in my humble opinion. Some of our Alabama gang have been known to bring a huge electric fan and a gas-fueled generator for use un-

der the tent there....but that just wasn't needed this year.

You'll note elsewhere the favorable report on the environmental conditions in Hotlanta this year....but that's just the beginning of verbal salutations from many to the PCMA for this years' contest. The food, the fellowship, the competition...it was just "the greatest". See that contest report elsewhere in this edition. One of the happiest attendees to the contest was Jim Slocum, as it was he who won the OS 91 raffle prize. Some of the crowd at the drawing was overheard saying "Ken Nix wasn't here?". Nix, as some of us know, won 3 engines in one season at similar raffles. His purchase of massive numbers of raffle tickets for these events has really been a "boon" to the sponsoring club's treasuries.

Mike Hare of the RAMM club in Montgomery, Alabama has already assured all of ideal weather conditions for the last weekend in August contest in Alabama's Capitol City.

There's been a good bit of "chatter" on the SPA Maillist regarding two of this and next years Expert pattern maneuvers and the execution of them. One is the Loop with 1½ snaps at the top....a difficult maneuver to execute precisely. Most of the difficulty, I have found is maintaining symmetry...IE: making the loop remain ROUND rather than stretched horizontally. I have yet to award a 10 or perfect score for this maneuver.... however, I do recall having awarded a 9 for one of our SENIOR or PRE-SENIORS....don't recall which, was very close to per-

fect. His symmetry was almost right-on as he snapped into the incoming crosswind...and it just so happened the drift imposed by the strong crosswind was just right to stop the airplane dead on heading. I was set to award that perfect score....when the pilot (evidently awe-struck by the perfect heading at the snap-and-a-half conclusion)....delayed his ½ rollout at the completion of his loop resulting in the one point deduction.

The other expertise-testing maneuver is the Reverse Spin. I have found that releasing ones' up-elevator at the center of the two spins is very "gutsy" and most times I will refrain from releasing it....and accept a downgrade for the models' creeping upwind rather than chancing a zero by trying to force the nose of the airplane vertical and reentering a stall condition for the 2nd set of spins.

The current EXPERT pattern with these two maneuvers may not *flow* as well as those in past years....but isn't it a "hoot" trying to master it?

The time for the Memorial Trophy Fly-off..is drawing nigh. This, is the pinnacle of the annual Masters contest.this September in Cullman, AL. I recently revisited the 2002 Masters results on the SPA Webpage to determine the participants in the "Fly-Off" this year. According to the qualifications at the 2002 Masters, the qualifiers this year with scores from last year are: Ed Hartley 1000, Malcolm Rutledge 929, from the Super Senior Class.....Jamie Strong 984, Curt Diggs 976 from the Senior Class. In event one or more of the aforementioned qualifiers cannot compete...1st Reserve Senior pilot would be Keith Watson 950, 2nd would be Jim Ivey 946. 1st Reserve Super Senior would be Frank Chick 910, 2nd would be Dennis Hunt with 906. What a line-up of talent..... I wouldn't want to miss this "shoot-out" on a bet! Enjoy the reports, results, photos, etc. in this issue of the SPA Newsletter after today's visit to the practice field and a few good flights. Best to all.

From the Vice President

Well guys, here I am casting about for a topic for the newsletter article again. Two months fly by and it can be really difficult to generate ideas to write about. Could we possibly get by with a quarterly newsletter? It would save 33% on postage and not strain our collective intellect as much as is currently the case.

To say that this year has been a pivotal one for SPA is a gross understatement. The founder of the organization has resigned from the board of directors and many of the Chapter 1 members who were charter members of SPA and were in at the beginning have decided that the event has become something that it was never meant to be and have stopped participating in SPA events. This is very regrettable to me, as these are all close friends and flying buddies.

The problem seems to be that we have strayed pretty far from the original SPA concept. The actions have been gradual and may have seemed innocuous enough at the time, but the overall effect is one that some think is ruining SPA. This whole effort has been a learning experience for everyone involved. It was believed at the beginning that everyone would embrace the original concept and keep it pure. Unfortunately, the competitive urge took over and we now have creeping erosion of all that has made SPA a success in the past. It has been pointed out that SPA should have had a constitution that prevented 3% rules and other rules changes that create the divergence from what was intended. This constitution would have to be written in stone and not subject to indiscriminate change. It is amazing how little change is required to completely kill an entire concept, particularly when that concept is for simplicity and simplicity. These two things seem to be anothema to some competitors.

Because what was envisioned as a stable and constant competitive environment doesn't seem to exist within the current framework of SPA, there has been preliminary discussion of starting a new organization with the original SPA objectives and the aforementioned cast-in-stone constitution to make sure that the event doesn't go the way of so many competitive events. Only time will tell whether this will happen. Maybe, just maybe, things can be worked out to everyone's satisfaction. I hope this is the case, but frankly it is hard to be optimistic. Competition is a cannibalistic animal. Without serious restraints it will invariably eat itself

LSK Pattern 2003 by Allan Worrest, SPA 201

The Lincoln Sky Knights, located in Lincoln, NE, held their annual Pattern contest on July 27. It is a modified SPA contest where SPA schedules are flown but the Sportsman and Expert classes are open to all AMA aircraft. There are no age groups. We have been doing this for about three years. Sixteen people flew. Seven entered Novice, three entered Sportsman, and six flew Expert. Half of the contestants were from outside of the club. One person, Jerry Voth, drove in from Kansas. The rest were from eastern Nebraska.

The contest leadership changed this year. John Willman and Rich Boelts were in charge. Rich was the official CD and cook. John organized the contest and ran it.

Rain caused the contest to have a late start. It would have started somewhat late even if the weather had been good. The LSK runway is oriented north-south. Early morning fliers are forced to look into the sun if they are not to fly over the pits. The entire first round was threatened by ominous clouds. It cleared by the end of the last round. The wind was unusually light. After the first round, contestants took a lunch break. We were able to complete three rounds of flying.

Trophies were awarded to the top three fliers in each class. Every contestant had a chance in a random drawing for prizes. Hobby-Town USA in Lincoln donated gift certificates. Waverly R/C (Waverly, NE) gave a glow booster. John Willman provide some other merchandise.

The LSK Pattern contest is the third of four similar contests to be held in the state this year. What this form of pattern will evolve into is hard to predict. I doubt that it becomes a pure SPA contest. There is really no nostalgia for flying 70's aircraft. In Expert, Nick Reiss flew a Hanson Runaround with a piped YS61 long stroke. Willman had a state-of-the-art, wide body Excellence powered by a YS140L, and Jerry Voth had a Hanson Excess with a ST2300 up front. I had the only legal SPA aircraft, a Bridi Killer Chaos with an OS61FX, entered in the contest.

Nor is the contest likely to turn into AMA pattern. Too many of the senior contestants had flown AMA pattern and expressed a dislike for the turnaround schedule. Frankly, I find the SPA Expert schedule more fun than the AMA Advanced. The present format has encouraged old and new fliers to try pattern again.

Maybe that is success enough.




