## **Marvelous Masters 2005**

*Guntersville, AL Sept. 18, 2005......*When a group of "greatto-be-with" RC Pattern Pilots convene for an SPA Precision Aerobatic Contest....it is more fun than eating Ice Cream (Homemade) on a 4th of July. Its' even greater than that when it is the SPA MASTERS contest!

Auburns RC Model Club, the PLANESMEN....stacked up the "goodies" this weekend for the annual SPA MASTERS there. Beginning with Friday afternoon's practice, the clubmembers greeted early arrivals with host hospitality and it lasted til after the awards ceremony on Sunday with nary a cessation. Each was presented with a neat "schedule of events"....and this schedule was closely adhered to.

Business was kept to a minimum at our Saturday night MASTERS annual Banquet in favor of good food, fun and fellowship! Our CSP has some great ideas for 2006 scheduling of contest events. All of our officers who were present at the Banquet have agreed to run for reelection to their current offices and Board Positions. The one unable to attend has since agreed and is eager to repeat in 06.

Glen, the chief Chef served up grilled hotdogs and hamburgers, cold soda pop, homemade desserts and even some Ice cold "bubbly" after flying ceased each day. The club provided and flew a Superstar 40 at which any and all visitors could fire "paintballs" at each low, slow pass. It met its' demise Saturday evening when some lucky contestant disabled its' control surfaces with some good shots.

Highlights of the MASTERS each year is the sudden-death "flyoff" for the honor of retaining the Memorial Trophy for one year. This year, as a result of our CSP Chairman Jamie and Webmaster Ed's BOARD motion back in January...a similar "sudden-death" flyoff was conducted for each Class. The top two contestants going into the Masters flew a one-time flight before 5 judges to determine winners. Of the 5 scoresheets, both the HIGH and the LOW was tossed out and the remaining three totaled for the determining score.

On Saturday afternoon, scores for the NOVICE class and the Senior Expert classes were exactly **tied!** What great flying..I had the pleasure of serving as one of the 5 judges on Saturday....all 5 of us agreed...these participants flew much better during the "shoot-out" than during regular competition. The two classes above had a "flyoff"-"flyoff" on Sunday to determine a winner! Man....how is **that**, for close competition!

"Tongue-in-Cheek"...I urged each flier prior to the "flyoff" in a Coach Bear Bryant type pre-fly-off dissertation "not to screw up"....not even a "little-bitty bit". Several told me they enjoyed the feeling of flying without any pressure on them!

A terrific raffle saw a number of winners of prizes ranging from "trinkets" to the PRIMUS or modified TAURUS kit which went home with Randy Roberts of the Cullman, AL club. To Henry Helmke, Rick Helmke, Brian Diez, Julian Gomez,....others who hosted the Marvelous Masters this week-end.....we are extremely grateful, it couldn't have been better!

Others have described the high points of what went on at our Cullman contest. The results are on the website with lots of pictures. I'd like to comment from a CDs point of view.

First, the **Open** classes. This was a bit of a disappointment because of the limited participation. I had hoped to draw in four or five pilots in each class who like our concept but lack equipment. By giving them the chance to fly our format with existing equipment, I'd hoped to infect others. Among our own membership, we have pilots that prefer pipes and retracts and, therefore, do not compete. Even these were conspicuously absent. I will probably offer the open classes again in the Spring. If there is no further participation, I'll declare the experiment a failure and forget it, refusing to ever again react to "I'd compete, but you won't let me fly ....". Please see Eric Nessler's comments about the differences in equipment on the Classic Pattern forum on RCUniverse. The competition in the Open Expert class was fierce. Who among us can remember when Bruce finished 5th in class?????????? In truth, Bruce opted out to allow the young guys to fight for the win. I wish he had stayed in. Eric Nessler beat him the first round. Might it have happened again?

Close results. Please observe in the results that, after six rounds, Wendell Cornelius beat John Johnson by 2.75 point, Bill Kite won both Sunday rounds to beat Jon Lowe by 1.3628 points in Sportsman and Jamie Strong won both Sunday rounds to beat Eric Nessler by 4.90 points in Open Expert. That's keeping it interesting to the very end.

Good things that happened. No one complained to me about anything but the weather. Everyone was ready every time for his flight. We had very little down time. The only exceptions were while waiting for me to change lines as a judge. The last two pilots landed within about 30 seconds of each other to end round 6. Duane Wilson brought his wife to a contest on their anniversary and lived to tell about it. What a woman! How many of us could get away with that? Rhea Starnes counted four rounds better than 900. Ron Reed returned to competition. No one crashed, though some missed the runway early on Saturday.

#### **ABOUT THE OS MUFFLER**

A word about the OS muffler. OS changed the muffler and intake about a year and a half ago.

Apparently, they wanted cleaner and quieter. Theygot both, but they also changed a very well behaved engine into one that can be really cranky. Engine runs have been very inconsistent. OS, of course, knows nothing about this

probem. There are two fixes. The easiest is to find an oldstyle muffler, (like the one pictured above) or use one of an OS70. These mufflers have a bit smaller capacity, but give much better engine performance. The needle is much less sensitive, and you get an extra 400 rpm for free. Second, you could also modify the new muffler.

Carefully, cut the muffler around the last ring. The stinger is a press fit. Cutting only through the outer layer will release the stinger but leave an inner lip so it can be re-

attached. Once the stinger is off, drill/grind the baffle out. When the baffle is gone, use JB Weld to glue the stinger back in. Drill the joint for a small sheet metal screw for added security. This also gets you an extra 4-500 rpm. Next, drill the stinger outlet to remove about half the wall. Gain is about 100 rpm. Disconnect the line from the crank case to the intake manifold.

Either replace the nipple in the intake with a screw (2mm, I think) or plug a short length of fuel tubing on the nipple. Let the line from the crank case vent into the air as with the older style engines. Gain

about another 100 rpm. The modified muffler is a bit louder than standard, but the performance gain is worth it. It does not exceed AMAlimits.

Fuel - Senior Pattern Association standard has become Morgan Fuel's 30%Heli. The oils are a bit lower viscosity than regular fuels. They are 100% synthetic. They are designed to handle the higher temps which a heli engine experiences. We have found that our engines run noticeablycooler and live lots longer. My current OS91 pumper is preparing for its fourth season. It probably has 5-600 flights with only an occasional plug (OS-F) and valve check.
