Minutes of the Board of Directors meeting January 24, 2009 The Oakwood Café, Dalton, Georgia

Bruce Underwood, President of the SPA, called the meeting to order. All Directors were present. Scott Sappington, Vice President Mike Robinson, Secretary/Treasurer Jamie Strong, Chairman of Special Projects Phil Spelt, Guide editor, Mickey Walker, Founder Emeritus and Ed Hartley, Webmaster.

The board approved the following rule changes.


- 1. In section 6 of the Competitors Guide "Point System" the following is added. (5) All classes except Novice shall be eligible for the points championship. There shall be no fly-off for the Novice class.
- 2. In section 1 of the Competitors Guide "1.General" this is added. If you fly in Novice and wish to compete for trophies you must be an SPA member. If you are not a member you will receive a certificate of participation. Different awards may be presented at the discretion of the Contest Director.
 - 3. In section 3 "Contestant Classification" the following is added to the end of item "b." Any Novice contestant who accumulates a score of fifty points or more in their best four contests during the regular contest season must move to the next highest or higher class no later than the end of the season that the points were accumulated.
 - **4.** In Section 1 of the Competitors Guide "1. General" The following is added. **To qualify for points or official standing within SPA all aircraft and classes of contestants shall use approved equipment.**
- 5. In Section 1, C. Aircraft/Engines (1) Regular Pattern, item "D" is replaced with the following. Electric motor powered aircraft weighing no less than 5 pounds, ready to fly, and generating no more than 1400 watts on a fully charged battery, and meeting all other SPA specifications, shall be allowed.
- 6. In Section 1 of the Competitors Guide "1.General (2) Senior Expert. is replaced with the following. Any pilot age 60 years and older may elect once each year which of the classes they will fly.

In other business the BOD approved:

- 1. The purchase of a wattmeter that may be used by Contest Directors. Jamie Strong to make recommendation as to type and instructions.
 - 2. That one card be issued to new SPA members once per year.
- 3. That a current list of members in good standing be available to Contest Directors by posting on the SPA web site.
 - 4. That the Secretary/Treasurer may auction SPA #500 to a qualified bidder.
 - 5. That lifetime memberships be made available for the following cost.
 - a. Less than 50 years old \$250.00 dollars
 - b. 50 through 54 years old \$200.00 dollars
 - c. 55 through 59 years old \$175.00 dollars
 - d. 60 through 64 years old \$150.00 dollars
 - e. 65 through 69 years old \$125.00 dollars
 - f. 70 or more years old \$100.00 dollars
- 6. That Lifetime membership numbers shall be preceded by the letter L and that the member may retain their current number and use the L, or that the Secretary issue a new number as deemed appropriate.
 Being no further business before the board the meeting was adjourned.

Proposal



Ed Note: Steve has personally CD'd more SPA and AMA contests than any current SPA member and CD, to my knowledge. ALL successful!

Proposing a contest is a two phase operation. You'll need club approval to host the event and SPA coordination of the date. For a first time contest, the club is the biggest issue. You'll need to describe how the event is conducted. Make sure the club understands the field will be tied up from about noon on Friday till early afternoon on Sunday for a two-day contest. They should expect about four rounds to be flown of Saturday, taking up most of the day. Two more rounds are normal on Sunday with competition being complete with competition and clean-up done by about 2:00 PM. Club members should expect to help with concession and scoring. For its help, the club will be exposed to a new form of R/C fun, make an interesting group of new friends and profit a few hundred dollars. Initially, profit is stressed least because turnout can be unpredictable. Once a contest becomes established, \$300-500 can be made to benefit other club activities.

Preparation

A sanction from AMA submitted by a licensed contest director is essential to protect both the club and the land owner. SPA contests are sanctioned as Class C Restricted because we have no official rules in the AMA rule book. Class C makes us technically a Fun Fly event. SPA contests are Restricted in that we have specific rules as to what kind of equipment can be used. Cost of sanctioning is around \$20. Sanctioning should be done as soon as club approval is granted and the SPA schedule coordinator has fit the contest into the schedule.

You'll need some folks to help. First, the contest director should plan to have no real function on contest day. That will leave him free to handle all the little stuff that invariably happens and still keep things running smoothly. You need a scorekeeper, at least one person to help with pilot registration (usually the club treasurer because he'll hold the money), a person to run each flight line and several folks to handle concessions.

You'll need some equipment. All that's needed can be borrowed from club members for the weekend. You need some sort of cover for a headquarters. It is best to have some sort of shade and a couple of chairs for the judges on each flight line. You need a full set of frequency pins. You need some way to post standings and a way to post flight orders that can be easily adjusted. You need a computer, printer and software for scoring. All clubs have someone with a machine they're willing to risk for a day or two. Software is either inexpensive or free. Concessions can be handled by members running a grill and dispensing drinks for coolers or having food brought in. Carefully done, concessions is a way to boost club profits.

The field should be freshly mowed. Some sort of barrier or markers should be present to establish safety lines so pilots unfamiliar with local rules don't setup improperly. Safety netting, ropes or lines of streamers all satisfy this need. Most flying sites already have something of this nature in place for regular operations. Do take advantage of pre-registration as offered on the SPA website. This service allows a contest director to know, within one or two, how many pilots he'll have on Saturday morning. The CD can better plan for lunch, have the computer setup, begin to establish flight orders and get a preliminary idea of who he'll be using to judge.

Do not forget to order awards. Plan for three places in each class. Many clubs give awards to fifth place in Novice to encourage participation. Awards can vary from framed computer generated certificates to commercially produced plagues or trophies.

Production

Most clubs close the field for contest practice on Friday afternoon. Early arrivals will fly a flight or two to familiarize themselves with the field while they renew old friendships and establish new ones. The CD or some club official can use this time to begin regulating parking and where pilots setup their own tents.

Final setup is completed early on Saturday morning. No matter how carefully you plan, there are always little glitches to be ironed out. Set up registration so pilots can sign the

AMA forms and pay entry fees. Hang your sanction form for public display. The forms and sanction protect everyone is case of an accident. During this time, final computer setup is completed. Just enter pilot information collected from those who did not pre-register.

Starting time is dictated by local conditions. Usually, a pilots' meeting is held around 9:00AM. Conduct whatever type of opening ceremony suits you personal taste, then review any local rules so all pilots are informed. There may be some discussion of individual maneuvers. Find answers for everyone's questions at this point. Describe which classes will fly on what flight line and who will start the judging. Tell you pilots what time they should be ready to start flying.

After flying starts, keep the flight order board in a place where pilots can keep themselves informed as to when they'll fly. Also, have someone assigned to keep each flight line running. His job will be to keep at least the next two or three pilots near the flight line with their equipment so they're ready to go in the event of a short flight or the next guy's inability to start his engine. This duty is critical during the first couple of rounds to insure there are no delays. Once your contest gets rolling, most pilots are pretty good at keeping track of when they're to fly, but it's still necessary to have someone running the line to make adjustments as needed.

The contest director should keep track of who is judging which classes and how many times they've been used. It is way too easy to use the same guys over and over because they're qualified and will do it without complaint. It's also unfair to everyone. It wears your judge out. No matter who the judge is, scores are also more fair when many eyes have seen the class. Everyone judges a little different. The best result comes from the average of a broad range of scores.

Finishing on Sunday should be done quickly and politely. Keep scores processed so there is no delay when the contest ends. Pilots who are finished will be packing their stuff during the last round. Talk a little during award presentation, but keep it short. Your pilots have to drive home. Get them down the road as quickly as possible. **Steve Byrum**

SPA National Points Race



Hello fellow SPA members. My name is Bob Wetzel and I am the SPA's "Keeper of the Points". I am going to attempt to give y'all an overview of the points system and how it works. The National Points Race runs from the Masters contest of the prior year to the Masters Contest of the current year. This means the 2009 Points Race began with any sanctioned SPA event that started AFTER the 2008 Masters Contest, which was held in Prattville, AL, the end of September, 2008.

To qualify for points or official standing within SPA, all aircraft and classes of contestants shall use approved equipment.

Here is how the points earned are determined. In every class, you earn one point for competing, and one point for everyone in your class that you beat. In addition to this:

1st place gets a five point bonus

2nd place gets a four point bonus

3rd place gets a three point bonus

4th place gets a two point bonus

5th place gets a one point bonus

Here is an example; there are 10 contestants in a class, First place would get:

1 point for competing

9 points for the 9 contestants you beat

5 bonus points for 1st place

TOTAL 15 points

Second place would get:

1 point for competing

8 points for the 8 contestants you beat

4 bonus points for 2nd place

TOTAL 13 points

And so on..... Last place would earn 1 point.

Throughout the season (Masters to Masters), we tally all contestants points and post them on the SPA website. The spreadsheet will show the contestant's name, the contests you flew in and the points earned in that contest. It will also give you a total of all points earned for the season and a total of your BEST four contest points. This is **THE** number used to determine your official standings in the SPA National Points Race. At the Masters, points earned will be multiplied times 1.5 If you scored 8 points you would earn 12 points for the Masters contest. These points will be added to your BEST four contest points for your seasons TOTAL POINTS. This total determines your standings for the season and your placement for a Master's Trophy.

At the Masters for the current year, the top two contestants from each class, except Novice, will participate in a "fly off" for a special Trophy. The Senior Experts will be flying for the Memorial Trophy which they will get to keep for the year. You can only win this trophy 3 times.

There is no "fly off" at the Masters in the Novice class. We keep track of points earned in the Novice Class for the purpose of determining when a novice flyer needs to "move up" to a higher class. The official wording is as follows: Any Novice contestant who accumulates a score of fifty points or more in their best four contests during the regular contest season must move to the next highest or higher class no later than the end of the season that the points were accumulated.
